## **Anthros Closer to Home Interview with Walter Dodd**

### What is your area of expertise?

My specialty is archaeology, and more specifically ethnoarchaeology. I am particularly interested in the spatial organization of activity among small-scale farmers, how their behavior translates into the structure of archaeological sites, and how and why different site-structural patterns have evolved over time.

### Describe your current research?

I have recently been analyzing spatial patterning at cerros de trincheras (literally "entrenched or fortified hills"). These terraced hilltop sites in the American Southwest and northern Mexico have generated considerable controversy over whether they are residential sites, fortifications, farming plots, or ceremonial locations.

### What is most memorable about this project?

I am bringing a novel ethnoarchaeological perspective to interpreting these sites which will hopefully broaden our understanding of them.

### Why are you interested in this topic?

I am always looking for an interesting problem that has a potential solution.

# If you could be born into any other culture what would it be?

The Seminole culture of south Florida during the eighteenth or nineteenth century. I cannot imagine a greater challenge than trying to farm the Everglades in the midst of snakes, Spanish moss, gators, snowy egrets, mosquitoes, hurricanes, and hummocks.

### Who's your favorite anthropologist?

Lewis Binford, Marvin Harris, or Charles Darwin.

#### What is your favorite novel?

"An American Tragedy" by Theodore Dreiser. Or "The Good Earth" by Pearl S. Buck.

# What advice would you give to anthropology students for entering the work world?

Know the fundamentals. Make learning a lifetime pursuit. Don't be afraid to take chances.
