
MISSION

The B.A. in Latin American Studies will prepare students for a wide variety of jobs in different fields, including:

- government agencies
- international agency service
- the nonprofit sector
- teaching in the social science, humanities, or language fields
- graduate work

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

The B.A. requires a minimum of 120 units, which includes courses for the major, General Education, electives, and all university requirements.

Students seeking a B.A. degree in Latin
American Studies must be in good standing
with the university and must maintain a minimum
GPA of 2.75. Majors need to develop proficiency
in either Spanish or Portuguese by graduation.
As part of the program, students are strongly
encouraged to spend a semester abroad
in Latin America, Spain, or Portugal, which
is often possible through available financial
aid resources.
